The English Language Exam is a computer-based test whose aim is to check if the candidate is a user of English at B-2 level (upper- intermediate). This is the level that is required in the university admission process.

It assesses all four language skills: reading, listening, writing and speaking and contains tasks assessing lexical and grammatical competence.

The broadness of the candidate's vocabulary and grammatical correctness is tested using gapfilling, multiple-choice and multiple matching tasks, sentence correction tasks and sentence transformations.

Reading comprehension tasks are based on matching and rearranging passages and expressions in texts.

Writing and listening skills are tested with open-ended questions. Candidates will also be asked to write a summary based on a recording.

The maximum score for the test is 100 points, the score of 50 (i.e. 50%) or above is considered a "pass".

The exam lasts **90 minutes**.

Topics which need to be revised for the test:

GRAMMAR:

adjectives and adverbs future tenses (future simple, continuous and future perfect) mixed conditionals modals – can't have, needn't have modals of deduction and speculation narrative tenses passives

phrasal verbs relative clauses reported speech will and going to for prediction wish

gerund or infinitive countable and uncountable nouns articles (the/a/an) word building (positive and negative prefixes; suffixes) collocations prepositional phrases

VOCABULARY:

The vocabulary related to general topics (e.g. current affairs, everyday life, feelings and attitudes etc.) allowing the user to understand the main ideas of complex texts (spoken and written) on both concrete and abstract topics and to produce clear texts and discuss a wide range of subjects.
